President's Message (cont'd)

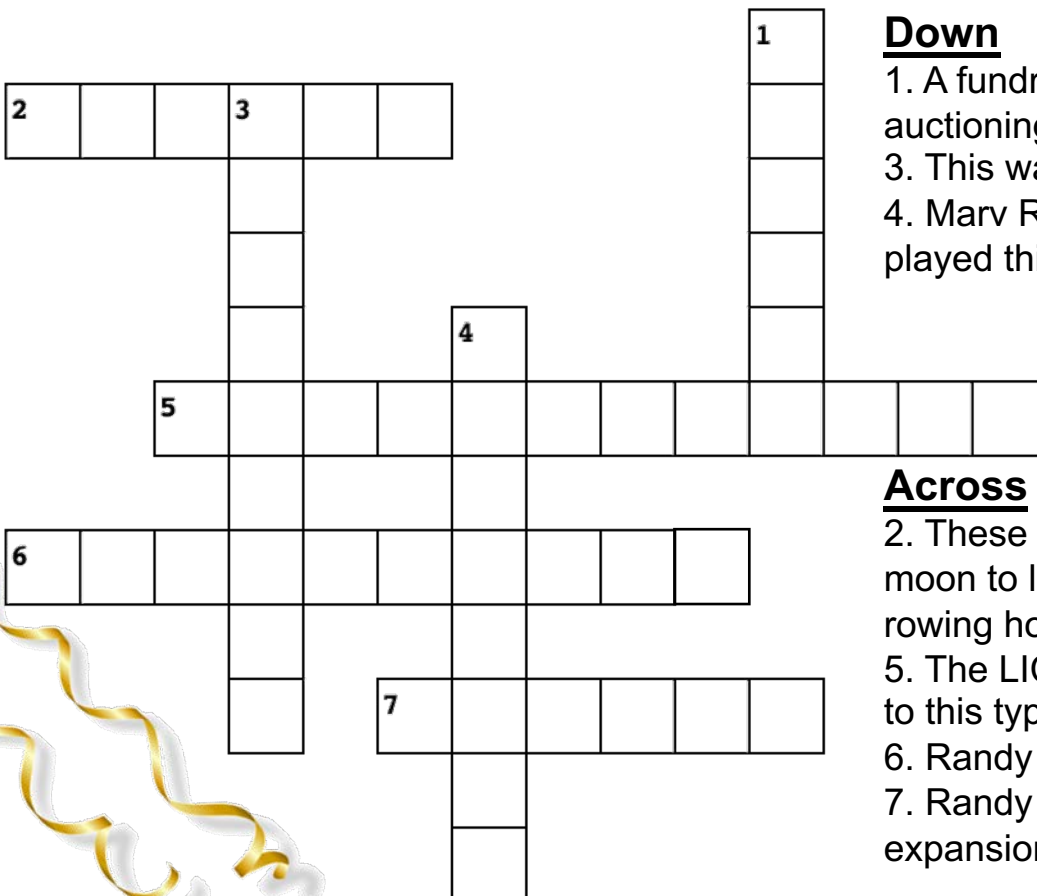

The Longbranch Foundation (TLF) - January 2021 Update

We are all rejoicing that we are starting a new year with the hope of a brighter future!

Your gifts of time and money have once again helped us fulfill our goal of improving the KP Community.

To give you an idea of how your foundation supported our community, we expanded our scholarship program to include students pursuing vocational higher education. 100 Years in Longbranch

The 20's 100 years ago...

Arguably, our state, itself, saw many beginnings in the 20's: Washington State adopted the "Cougars" nickname; the first UW Husky, Frosty I, joined the team. (Ironically, all of the "huskies" that lead the team are, in fact, Alaskan Malamutes); Virginia Mason Med Center was founded; Seattle elected Bertha K. Landes, the first woman mayor of a major American city on March 9, 1926., etc. The 20's were huge for Washington, so let's just focus on our small corner of it.

The Key Peninsula as we know it today was originally called "Longbranch Peninsula" in the 1841 Wilkes Expedition land survey, a name it retained for nearly 100 years. Longbranch, as many of us know, was named for Long Branch, New Jersey, a resort town back east. The Post Office later joined the two names into one, to avoid confusion and incorrect delivery with Long Beach, WA.

There is some debate surrounding the name "Filucy." One source claims it is probably derived from a misspelling of felucca, an Old World sailing vessel. Others claim it may also refer to the Spanish word filudo (sharp or sharp-edged) when referring to the shape of the bay, and yet another states that the name originates from "Titusi," a Haida name for the place, noted on the original Wilkes Expedition survey of 1841. The most romantic origin story comes from the Key Peninsula Museum's site, which notes that Filucy was the name of the Haida wife of Pierre Legard, a French Canadian who built the first hut on the Key. In 1889 Edward Yeazell developed a plan to turn our Filucy Bay into a resort that would rival those of the east coast, a popular holiday destination in the roaring 20's. An economy and population still reeling from a global pandemic—this has a familiar ring—seized any opportunity to drop cares and worries and simply relax (if one were privileged enough to afford the means). Yeazell's idea was to expand on the old 1885 wharf and capitalize on the incoming traffic sure to come with the increase in the newer, more efficient, steam-driven boats. Unfortunately for him, but, I think, not for us, his resort ambitions were never realized. However, his ambition kept the dock area a busy place until the late 1920's.

By the late 1920's, the original dock area supported a thriving co-op fed by incoming ferry passengers (until its collapse into the bay in 1928), a community church, and a hotel. Luckily for residents of our side of the sound, the "Great Blowdown" of 1921 did not hit our peninsula as hard as it hit the Olympic Peninsula, where an estimated three- to seven-billion board feet of old-grown timber was downed.

The stock market crash of 1929 was slow to impact our part of the country; its impact will be felt more in the 1930's, which we'll look at next month.

Here's to a Happy "New" Year in which we can eventually gather in person to celebrate the LIC centennial!

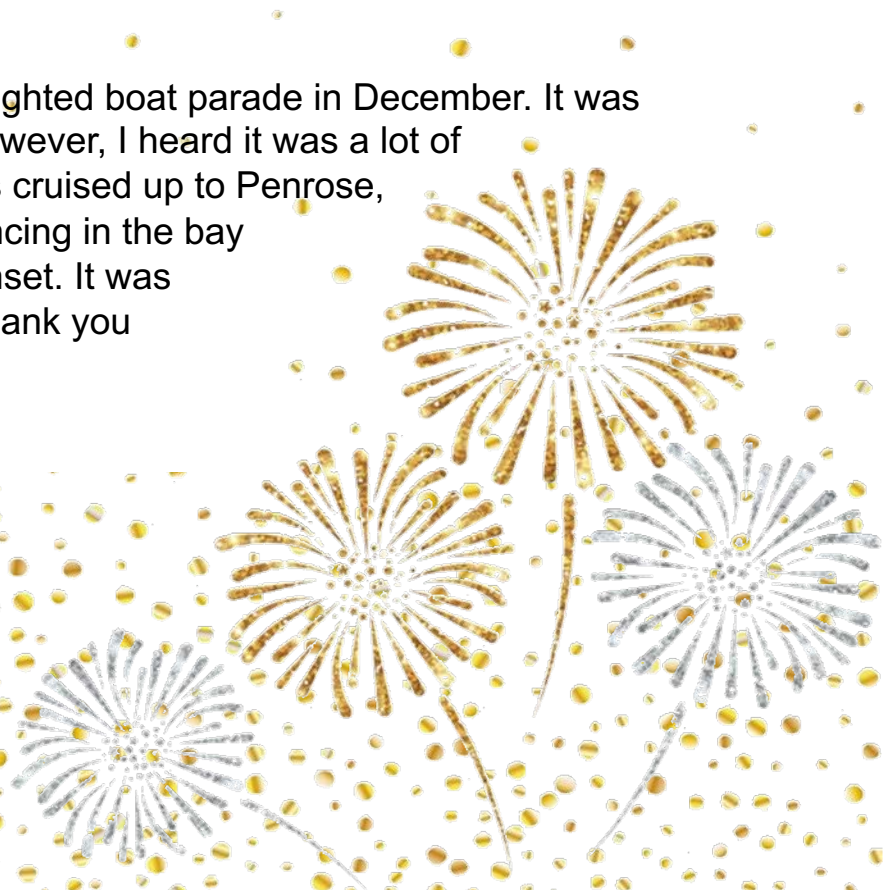

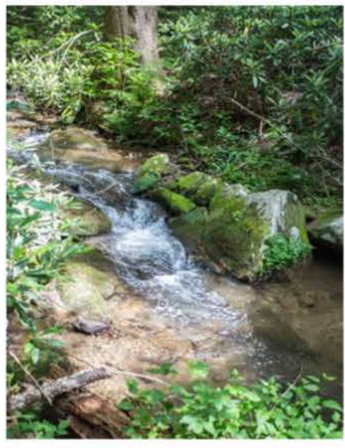

What a hidden gem and so close. Even in the mist and dark skies, they were beautiful. I'm just delighted.

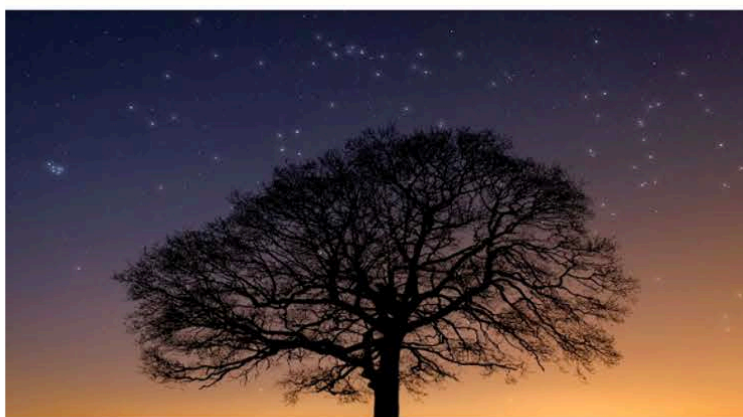
The signs are so good and well placed. Parking, of course, is great. It is a miniature wilderness area, requiring a bit of imagination to block out the car sounds!
