President's Message:

September 2017

My message last month focused on volunteerism and volunteer opportunities. Summer Fest gave us an opportunity to volunteer, and we certainly did by logging more than 1,200 hours of service by 30 volunteers over an eight month period. That is simply incredible and their efforts are very much appreciated.

And speaking of Summer Fest, all I can say is "Wow!" We had 109 guests, 14 sponsors, and more than 50 businesses and individuals donating items for the silent and live auctions. On top of that, we were fortunate to hold the event at what I believe is about the best venue on Key Peninsula. I am so grateful to Fred Leenstra and Wanda Buhl for opening their property to us and helping us make it such a huge success. In case you haven't heard yet, we grossed more than \$41,000.00, and while we're still tallying up the expenses, suffice it to say this is a wonderful start towards the goal of creating a sustainable funding mechanism for the scholarship activities supported by the LIC membership and The Longbranch Foundation.

Looking forward, it will be a busy fall because we have a number of events coming up in the next two months, including the Labor Day Weekend Dance on September 2nd, the Membership Meeting on September 20th with Llyn De Danaan from Humanities Washington as the featured speaker, Fiber Arts on October 7th, another Membership Meeting on October 18th, and Trunk-Or-Treat on October 27th,

Squeezed into this same time frame is the work covered by the 2017 Pierce County Preservation Grant that must be completed on the building by mid-October. The work includes repair of the lower west windows, replacement of the office and store room doors in the meeting room, re-staining the kitchen counter and doors leading to the auditorium, and completion of the window removal in the office. In addition, we will be giving the meeting room and kitchen a badly needed face lift with new paint and staining of the beams.

There are plenty of things going on and it's very heartwarming to see so much activity and enthusiasm by our members. I would like to direct just a small amount of that enthusiasm to a few volunteer opportunities that we still have available, including assistance with identifying monthly programs for next year, and working with our Scholarship Committee to create guidelines for a sustainable program over the next five years. If you have an interest in any of these, please call or email me. These particular volunteer opportunities do not involve a large number of hours and can be done on a very flexible schedule.

Enjoy the remaining few days of summer we have left, and stay safe.

LIC General Membership Meeting

August 16, 2017

The meeting was called to order at 7 pm. by Clark Van Bogart, president.

Clark introduced Lynn Larson, LIC historian, who spoke on the origins of the LIC. Excerpts from her speech follow:

Incorporation papers list December 10th, 1921 as the date of the official beginning of the Longbranch Improvement Club, although research shows that it was in existence for at least a few months before that. The incorporation signified a shift in focus from entertainment and social activities to philanthropic and civic pursuits. What prompted this shift was baseball. Mark Richert (who is buried in the Longbranch cemetery) had played baseball growing up in the area and then went on to play professionally. In 1908, the Longbranch team won the Washington State Semi-Pro Championship, with eight Richerts on the team.

Before the LIC clubhouse was built, meetings were held in the Longbranch Library Hall and in the basement of the Longbranch Congregational Church.

Many activities apart from meetings were held in the Library Hall, including dances. Before the dance, men would prepare the floor by sliding pieces of paraffin across the surface. Local talent would often provide the music, although there were visiting bands from Tacoma as well (including The Jazz Maniacs). Posters were set up along the road advertising the dances.

Socials were also popular, usually held on a week night and featuring dancing and refreshments (coffee, tea and sandwiches.) Each had a theme, such as a Hard Times Dance, a Barn Dance, a Scandinavian Dance, a Carnival Dance etc.

Once the LIC was incorporated, one fund raising strategy was that of auctioning off picnic baskets prepared by the ladies.

The Library Hall had its own board of officers, which, Lynn believes, was the seed of the Longbranch Improvement Club. In September, 1921, with funds raised by the Labor Day Dance, the Library Hall purchased six acres of land for a school and baseball field.

A couple of weeks later, a notice stated that "The Improvement Club of Longbranch has purchased ten acres of land for a people's park and athletic field. This club has a large membership which meets every first and third Thursday of the month at Penrose Hall (the afore mentioned church basement).

Article two of the December 10, 1921, incorporation stated that the "Objects and purposes for which this corporation is formed is buying real estate for the purpose of a consolidated school, athletic and picnic purposes and to encourage any activity for the betterment of schools, home making, roads, marketing, dairy, poultry and all its branches." In 1922, the LIC was the welcoming committee for the arrival of the Elk, the first organized ferry service from Steilacoom to Longbranch.

Given the important role that baseball played in the formation of the LIC, Lynn suggested that the club's Centennial should include a baseball game.

Francie agreed to stand in for Curt Scott, speaking on earthquake preparedness.

Given that the last major earthquake occurred in 1700, we are overdue for another. We do not know where or when but seismic geologists warn of a series of earthquakes of magnitude eight or higher along the Cascadia Subduction Zone, resulting in landslides, liquefaction, fires and possible tsunamis, destroying infrastructure, buildings etc. It is recommended that one have on hand a two week supply of food and water.

The Vaughn Community Center is being retrofitted to serve as a shelter, the closest one for Longbranch residents. There will be an Earthquake Emergency Preparedness Fair at Gig Harbor High School on September 30th, from ten until three.

OFFICER REPORTS

Secretary: Jane Eiseman asked that the minutes of the July meeting be accepted as submitted. MSP.

<u>Treasurer:</u> Jim Hettinger announced that July guest moorage at the Marina, budgeted at \$2,800, actually came to somewhat higher.

The 2016 LIC tax return should be completed shortly.

Check Reimbursement forms are available for members on the LIC website and at the clubhouse. Please be sure to note on the form whether the monies should come from the LIC or from the Foundation.

<u>Trustee at Large:</u> Francie Carr reported that there are two tables of lost and found articles. Any items not claimed at tonight's meeting will be donated to the Angel Guild.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

<u>Membership:</u> Nancy Carr thanked Dee McGuiness, Lynn Carr and Kelly Hettinger for setting up the meeting room and Cheril Allen and Susan Quigley for their work in the kitchen.

Members were asked to turn in the form(s) showing their volunteer hours.

Events: Jan Brown announced that the next event will be the Labor Day dance on September 2nd, for which tickets are available at the Marina, Sunnycrest Nursery and Blend. A sign-up sheet was distributed for event volunteers. Nancy Carr noted that all of the booths for Fiber Arts have been taken.

<u>Building and Grounds:</u> Sharon Gearhart reported that the well casings have been scrubbed, the iron deposits removed. The pump is still functioning and, although the pump is well passed its normal life expectancy, Nicholson Drilling recommends continuing to use it until it dies.

Work is progressing on the Pierce County Preservation grant. Sharon notified the county that replacing the bank of west windows is estimated to be \$20,000 and, thus, could not be part of the existing grant. The County recommended that the \$1,400 allocated be used to replace the lower west windows.

The total of additional funds needed to complete the grant work (which must be completed by October 31, 2017) on the lower window, the replacement of the office and storeroom doors, the re-staining of the kitchen cabinets and the auditorium doors is \$4,505. The LIC Board authorized using funds from the LIC Building Capital Improvements reserve account to complete those projects, as well as painting and staining in the meeting room, up to \$9,000.

<u>Marina</u>: Robert Theisen informed the members that the striping in the parking lot has been finished.

A 911 call from the Marina now displays the actual physical address.

Inform Robert or Lynn Carr if you know of anyone wanting winter moorage.

Sunshine: Clark has received a letter from Marlies Van Cise who is resigning. A new volunteer is needed for this post.

Newsletter: A reminder from Helen Jamieson to turn in any articles to her by the 23rd of this month.

<u>Historian:</u> Lynn Larson, who compiles a list each year of what the LIC has accomplished, said that she has no records of what was done in 2006. If anyone has any information, please let her know.

Old Business

Summer Fest was a tremendous success. Kathy Barrett thanked all the volunteers and donors. The event gross income was \$41,605. Bills for the event still need to be paid. Preliminary statements/receipts will be sent out to donors, sponsors and guests within the next week or so.

New Business

<u>The Longbranch Foundation:</u> Barbara Floyd suggested checking out the new web site and giving her your feedback. Online donations can now be made through PayPal. A brokerage account is being set up to allow stock donations.

Peg Bingham announced that <u>CPR classes will be held at the Key Center Fire Department on September 30th</u> and October 18th.

FROM THE MARINA CHAIR:

We had a medical emergency down at the marina, which brought up a new problem. Because of the way the 911 system works, you must know the physical address of the emergency. After explaining to our Fire Chief that we have boaters from all over, he contacted the 911 System folks and was able to attach the physical address of the Marina to the Longbranch Marina name. If anyone calls 911 from the Marina they need to say they are at the Longbranch Marina. The system then automatically shows the physical address. Also, he told me if you are using your cell phone to call 911, when the operator gets on, immediately advise you want Pierce County 911. Most of the time the calls go to Olympia based on cell tower access. By advising you want Pierce County 911, it will send the call to Tacoma and speed up the process. This last part applies to all cell phone calls from this area, not just the calls from the Marina.

Also Lynn did another fine job as Dockmaster. Thanks Lynn.



September 2017 Building and Grounds Chat Room:

The well got scrubbed a couple of weeks ago and it has really helped with the water quality. Running the water for several minutes daily helped clear the rusty water left in the well and the water quality is much better now, although you may still see some brownish looking fluid in the toilets and urinals. This will hopefully clear up gradually. Fortunately our pump was still in good condition and Nicholson Drilling suggested we use it until it dies and then replace it along with the iron casing that is causing the sediment problem. Meanwhile we need to change the filter under the kitchen sink about every two months. In addition, the grant work is progressing nicely ,although we needed to go to the Board to request additional funding since it became clear that a majority of the work was beyond volunteer capabilities and required professionals-this was especially true of the window work and staining of the counter and door frame. Randy Carr has gotten the window removed from the office and has sheet rocked the hole. The doors for the store room and office have been picked up and are in Gayle Brewer's garage. They will be brought to the LIC for staining and installation shortly. Legacy Renovations has removed the lower west widows next to the bathrooms and replaced them with particle board while they work on them at their shop-this done for safety reasons and probable lead in the glazing. They have replaced two damaged window panes and will finish glazing them when they come back to reinstall the windows. Jeff Tritt will be doing the re-staining of the kitchen counter and the door frame between the ball room and the meeting room. If you would like to know how it will look, check out the sample at the refrigerator end of the counter. The Board agreed to fund having the entire meeting room and kitchen repainted in addition to the grant work. So when all is said and done 'the Grand Old Lady" should have a significant and much needed face lift. The grant projects over the past two years have been stressful but really satisfying and I hope that we continue to follow this path to helping heal some of ravages of old age. Thanks to all of you and your support-we could not do it without you! As always I am open to suggestions if you have any. **sharon**


