MINUTES 3-19-2008

7:00 p.m. potluck

Attending: Dennis Stuhaug, president Tim Heitzman, treasurer Dean Latshaw, Dock chair Sue Stuhaug, Membership chair

Meeting was called to order at 7 p.m.

Old Business:

The outstanding architectural drawings by member Jim Olson for grounds improvements to the Longbranch Improvement Club grounds were reexamined. The 4 areas of potential improvements involved: landscaping and pavers to the patio area between the LIC Building and the south fence; construction of a "bridal bridge" and photo location over the stream just to the west of the building proper; construction of a deck and viewing platform at the pond in the forest (upon the foundation of a now demolished pump house; and construction of an amphitheatre and seating just to the north of the existing building, facing the north entrance which could be used as a stage.

The amphitheatre/seating segment of work excited much interest, but members feared that the location and the size would be insufficient for LIC activities. The stage would be limited to the existing entryway and seating would be limited. A larger facility, to the north and facing the copse of trees, would allow for more seating and a larger stage. Questions were raised as to the amount of materials needed for each project, as well as costs: as the planning is still preliminary these are not available. Timbers for the bridge and viewing platform, as well as for amphitheatre seating, would be milled from donated logs (at least a beginning in hand) and work would be by volunteers other than the portable sawmill for the milling. Members wanted a feeling for costs and a start date for the work.

Ann Deering questioned going ahead with any of the work until ivy infestations throughout the forest were eradicated. Pat Thompson, a noted gardener, said that the ivy while unattractive did not pose an immediate threat to the trees. He said the ivy trunks could be severed at ground level, thus killing the ivy. Phil Ingram commented that the ivy stalks could also be cut and the ends immersed in Roundup to kill the roots. Several members questioned using chemical eradication along the stream. Deering wanted to know if Building Chair Mike Hays or trails chair Rich Hildahl were scheduling a work party to begin stripping away the ivy. Neither were in attendance, and the membership was told that the two would be queried. Pat Thompson will offer his expertise in planning the ivy cutback.

New Business:

The Nominating Committee for the mid-year election (for the posts of president, treasurer, dock chair and membership chair) was announced. Chairman is Joe Barrow, with the committee comprised of John Biggs, Rich Hildahl, Mark Jones and Mike Hays. Barrow, Biggs, Hildahl and Jones are past presidents, Hays is a sitting board member as well as past member of a nominating committee.

Pat Thompson reported on the upcoming Regatta, slated May 3. A 12-mile course is planned, from the LIC Marina south to the Green #3 Buoy on the Nisqually Flats and return. It is a fun race, without handicapping or classes. Cost is \$12 to enter. The Skipper's meeting will be at 9 a.m., with the race starting at 10 a.m.

Mark Jones reported on the upcoming courtesy vessel inspections being offered at the Marina April 26. Any boat owner requesting such an inspection will have the vessel inspected for proper safety equipment by the U.S. Power Squadron. "It is a good reminder to have all your equipment in good order," he said.

Jones also informed the membership that a work party is slated at the Marina March 29, with a number of tasks such as painting, cleaning and maintenance on the agenda. The actual items to be accomplished will depend on the skills of those volunteering their time.

Debbie Ehrhardt and Traci Michel reported that everything was set to go for the first Longbranch Improvement Club Easter Egg Hunt, on the calendar March 22 from 1 to 2 p.m. The hunt is divided by age groups, so that all the kids will have a fair chance at finding treasures.

<u>Membership Report:</u>

Welcome to Mike Runyon, at the first meeting he has attended since joining. The hostesses were thanked: Pat Latshaw, Ann Deering, Eloise Colbert and Maryann McDonald.

Events Report:

Suds & Spuds was a great success, with about 100 people enjoying Irish music, learning to do Irish dances, supping on baked potatoes (with trimmings) and desserts, and quaffing a few drops of the good stuff as dispensed by the tender of the bar Don Davies. For a fun, social event the books balanced amazingly well, with costs well under the \$750 budgeted and income doubling the \$1000 optimistically proposed.

<u>Dock Report:</u>

The major items on the dock are the upcoming work party March 29, and the courtesy vessel inspections calendared April 26. Totem Yacht Club was here in March, kicking off the spring boating season. Other yacht clubs are starting to book space.

Building Report:

All repair and maintenance items on the to-do list for the LIC Building have been completed and are up to date, with two exceptions; there is still a small but nagging leak in the main hall but

while needing to be repaired this has been a low priority item pending any possible block grant funding through Pierce County for roof replacement; and the replacement of several cracked window panes.

Treasurer Report:

The club is in good financial health, with the figures through March 12 all on the healthy side. Annual payments for member moorage and for memberships make a bulge in income at the first of the year, money that will tide the club over until the income from the summer boating program comes in and carries it through the rest of the year. The club, from Jan. 1 through March 12, brought in \$2742.62 in building rental, \$28,489.11 in member, guest and winter moorage (and electrical service; \$2,029 from Suds & Spuds (St. Patrick's Day); \$276.23 in interest income; and \$1858.18 in member dues. Total income (including \$36 for the scholarship fund) was \$35,431.15. On the expense side, building costs for the period came to \$7,229.93, with the largest single item being fuel at \$4,631.80. Dock expenses totaled \$7,006.72, including \$1,369.26 for the DNR lease and \$1,559.42 for electricity. The club spent \$272.91 on events, most completing payments for 2007 events. Miscellaneous items added \$271.54 to the total, to bring expenses to \$14,781.10. The result was a net income of \$20,650.06.

Presidents Letter . . .

TIME has a different tick here on the Key Peninsula. It is less mechanical, and somehow more organic. Rather than a day sliced and diced into minutes and seconds, many here resonate to the ebbs and flow of tides, to the pattern of wildlife and to the color of our foliage.

The tides determine what beaches we may explore, establish the techniques in a boat race, even affects what time we plan on arriving for the LIC's traditional Opening Day breakfast. As the tide ebbs and the water level recedes, the pitch of the ramp from solid land to our floating docks becomes steeper.

Winter arrives, not as a date on the calendar but on the wings of the scoters, the goldeneye and bufflehead ducks. It is affirmed when the loons hang up their vivid plumage and splash down in drab colors. The winter birds. And winter leaves, not with the absoluteness of a specific number but with the sight of salamanders squirming across a roadway as their migrations begin. I know more than a few folks who patrol the roadways, seeking to save a few of the torpid little beasts - even though if you asked them there would be no way they would touch "one of those slimy little things".

Spring is when the bear cubs surface, when short-tailed raccoon kits play in the mud. Spring segues into summer as a glittering green feisty hummingbird defends his chosen sugar water feeder from all comers. We warn visitors to watch for deer in the twilight. Some call it the end of summer - here it is called blackberry season & fresh pies for breakfast become the norm.

That's not to say that the Peninsula develops a strain of folks more laid back. Our time is far more rigid than the mechanical tick-tock heard in urban Seattle. You CAN apologize for the white lie of being late because of the traffic, or the problems of parking. You CAN'T stand at the edge of the incoming tide line screeching at the water to go away. Well, not with any positive results.

Commute hour gridlock might send your blood pressure skyrocketing and put your schedule in the wastebasket, but a six-point buck bounding onto the Key Pen Highway at the wrong instant will totally ruin your day.

Good businesses, good technicians, give a window of when they hope to arrive, and then call if that window shuts on them. Sometimes they make it on their first time, sometimes they don't. Less experienced ones pencil in an arrival time to the minute and are surprised when there is no way on earth for them to adhere to it. We can learn to live with the best, with EQUANIMITY, or we can rail at the injustices of Nature's time...that's our choice! That's why we came to 884 country, and that's why we stay. The scale is more human, and instead of counting seconds, we can hear our heartbeat.

Reni will demonstrate several different watercolor background techniques which she uses in her paintings and you will learn how to mount paper on board and some sumi painting techniques and suminagashi.
