Quiemuth: A look at the life and tragic death of the Nisqually Indian leader Presented by Historian Drew Crooks Sunday, November 4th at 2pm DuPont Community Presbyterian Church, 502 Barksdale Ave

Historian Drew Crooks will present an illustrated lecture examining the life and tragic death of Quiemuth, a strong and capable Native American leader who lived from ca.1800 to 1856. An older half-brother of the famous Leschi, Quiemuth was appointed chief of the Nisqually Tribe by Governor Isaac Stevens in 1854. He was later killed in the Olympia office of Governor Stevens. No one was ever brought to justice for the crime. Mr. Crooks will look at the mysteries surrounding the chiefs murder and discuss why we should remember Quiemuth whose life and death helped shape the history of southern Puget Sound. Mr. Crooks has worked in various museums in the South Sound. He has written several articles of historical interest, including three books on the regions heritage. The lecture is free. Donations to the Dupont Historical Society will be gladly accepted.
