Two Waters Arts Alliance designated \$3000 in grant money from Angel Guild for the event and turned over program planning responsibilities to Mark Runions. Two Waters Art Alliance involved a significant number of local artists. LIC handled the Dessert Bar and the Beer Garden. Both groups benefited from the cooperative effort and participation by LIC volunteers was fantastic! (Unfortunately, I turned in the sign-in sheets and fear of leaving someone out made me forego the pleasure listing all volunteers.) Especially outstanding efforts were put forth by:

- Judy Riggs was invaluable as the major money handler;
- Phil Ingram handled the parking lot and has big plans for future events;
- Michael Hays did an amazing job managing a multitude of tasks--planned and unplanned. He arranged for borrowed equipment, helped with set-up, and handled emergency water system & electrical problems.

Mark Runions and I will be meeting with Two Waters in early September to begin planning for 2008. Yes, we will be discussing "more art and crafts and more food vendors" as suggested.



#### "Beyond the Borders" . . . Saturday's Serendipity

Saturday 8/4/2007, Longbranch was the centre of the world . . . and the world danced till it fell on its axis! Contributed by Lorraine Hart

Old mossback pal and band-mate Mark Runions came up with the vision for "Beyond the Borders," and was music event coordinator for this spectacular festival, held at the LIC. It was a collaboration between the LIC Board and the Two Waters Arts Alliance. Generous funding from the Angel Guild made this a free celebration for us.

Allow me to quote Mark, from the Key Pen News article: "Beyond the Borders will serve to break down barriers and bring people together. Music can be used as a healing tool. Our goal was to provide a variety of international music in order to expand the horizons of local folks, without the trouble and expense of leaving their own community." Inside the Club, an invitational art exhibit was set up, incredible desserts were on sale and a drum circle performed between the outside, main acts of the day. Outside was a beer garden (featuring imported beers and wines from around the world) Hawaiian food, and the main stage for music.

The magic began when seven beautiful Ugandan women took the stage and we were introduced to Eyerabira. Florence Eyerabira, the matriarch, led her daughters (all dressed in different exquisite colors) through songs with a back-up tape for music and rhythm. At first they were shy with their voices and harmonies (being more used to singing together at home) but, oh how beautifully those harmonies rose! One song's story was explained first. It told about doing good things in your life and the jewels that will be put in your crown in Heaven. It was slow and dreamlike and their voices wove crowns in the air around us.

Mama Florence, dressed in soft sage-green, began to lead the women in more relaxed folk songs and dances after the first, devotional songs. By this time their confidence had built with our joy and the party began to loosen. We Key Pen folk love to get a free-spirited groove on and it didn't take much to get us up and shaking.

I'm sorry to say I had to miss the second act, Brizee (a Mexican pop band) in order to run home and take care of some things. It was so very considerate of the world's centre to be only four miles from my house! I was assured, on my return, that Brizee was wonderful by the increase in the afternoon's sparkle and vibration. This is a community that knows how to enjoy themselves and each other. It was such a thrill for me to be able to be a part of the visiting audience of neighbors for a change, instead of being part of the working entertainment.

Now I was ready to listen to the featured act of the day, Pearl Django. The afternoon was feeling warm and welcoming with that palpable presence between those on stage and those in the audience. Violinist Michael Gray told us he had never been to Longbranch before but the, "sweet atmosphere here," would bring him back.

This band was such a thrill for me to watch. I love to hear them...but working bands often don't get to see other working bands, unless they share the same bill. This was my first chance to enjoy this Northwest pearl for a live set of gypsy jazz, full of freedom, movement and passion.

The band kicked-off with, "C'est Si Bon," lead guitar jumping in and around the pumping rhythm guitar and bass for the first solo before handing-off to the violin, which loosened as the opener warmed. The bass took a round with a playful solo and the song came full-circle back to Neil's guitar and some joyful harmonics....wow!

In some of the faster numbers (like Swing 48) I could actually get a feel, through the music, of the seemingly chaotic speed of change in the 1930's world of Django Rinehardt. It made me think of those cartoon cars that take the bend too fast...so the wheels extend to keep it on the road. There's enough speed and power in that music to get a gal in trouble!

What can I say about Pearl Django? Michael Gray's violin spins dreams and stories in my head, sometimes lifting my shoulders to hold the momentary sadness, or tilting my chin to its humour. Neil Anderson's guitar plays the memory of conversations in my heart with old friends, warm and deep. He makes me lean forward in my seat. Even when his fingers fly, no note suffers a drive-by. Ryan Hoffman's guitar had the slightly thinner, more treble sound, great for the

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pumping rhythm and some good bubbly leads to tickle the spine. Rick Leppanen's bass is a perfect adjustment for my belly chakra, especially with his solo that began "True Blanc Bolero," (in spite of some electric sound challenges) and his supportive playing is like the sturdy axle, upon which the melodies turn.

By the time they were finished I felt like a very full diner who couldn't stop smiling at the flavours still on the tongue and wondered if it was time to pack up the canvas rockers. But it was hard to leave the centre of the world, even if Home was only four miles away. It was hard to leave the "World Be-In" beautiful vibes... and I'm so glad we didn't because the final act of the day was a global delight.

Abrace means "Embrace," explained Samia Panni, who is co-founder of the group with Joyce Yarrow. Five women singers (who also did some percussion here and there) and a male percussionist took us around the world, in twelve languages, with rhythms built into vocal parts and rock-solid harmonies. There were Gods and Goddesses, Guides and Gauchos, grieving and giving. By the time they got to Miriam Makeba's "Pata Pata" (once a forbidden dance) we were back on our feet and dancing, neighbor with neighbor.

I'm sure the scientific satellites were all confused with their calculations on Saturday. We had enough peace, love and understanding to make Longbranch seem like the centre of the world. Not one person there would've disagreed.

Once again, kudos to Mark Runions for an excellent effort on behalf of the world, to the Longbranch Improvement Club Board, Two Waters Arts Alliance (Congrats to Bev Pederson, winner of the People's Choice award for her gorgeous painting of salmon) and, of course, to the Angel Guild for the gift of the day to our neighborhood.

 All in all I think is that it was a success and should be repeated. The publicity was superb.

- It was great PR with the community. We could promote it more effectively but as a first try, outstanding! Loved the burma shave signs.
- I think we should have sent out the notice to the boating community i.e. yacht clubs or individual boater guests for which we have email addresses.
- The bands were incredible. Mark should get a raise and a promotion.
- There were not as many young people as I'd expected at a free event. But we had no metal hands
- Next year: need more division of labor. Maybe even hire a production crew to set up and run infrastructure.
- Bands should be fed and watered after their performance. Did we give them tickets? Mrs. Wiley should be canonized St. Detailya.
- I think we could have improved on the food options. Someone asked me if we were serving any hotdogs! The sweets were delicious and we really enjoyed our favorite food Hawaiian Kalua pork. However, the line was too long and they didn't have enough help? Some may have preferred more choice and maybe a selection of ethnic foods including a vegetarian choice.
- Perhaps if one of the Bar/Pop "Tenders" folk were designated Lead, that person could be responsible for setting up the schedule for restocking etc.?
- Umbrellas for the beer garden? We were lucky on the weather...
- We anticipated the art being very nice, but it was very high-priced for the peninsula's majority. I'd love to see some nice jewelry and even artwork, but at a lower price. More of a mix perhaps. More artist participation, along with many of our highly talented local craft persons would have been better! I love the idea of supporting our local artists; please open the event to one and all and let the public decide what is worthy to be called art rather than hosting a formal high-art event (should be held in a more intimate setting). The winning art should be announced as it's auctioned off on the spot.
- Someone said you could have free admission but charge for parking - to help cover expenses.
- This was definitely one of the best events at the LIC in a really long time. It brought a broad spectrum of the community together in a most enjoyable manner.

#### Building an Elder-Friendly Key Peninsula

Mission: The work of The Mustard Seed Project is to build an elder-friendly Key Peninsula, by assuring that a full continuum of services and programs is available and affordable, which allows community members to "age in place" with dignity, respect, self-determination and safety.

Vision: A rural community where a full continuum of high quality affordable services and programs will meet the needs of aging neighbors; where the elderly live in their own homes as long as they wish; and senior housing options, including long-term care, are available locally, preserving the richness of this multi-generational community.

#### Values:

Dignity and respect for the individual; Emphasis on wellness and prevention; Support for self-determination and choice; Positive interaction between the generations; Creative problem solving and program development through community dialogue;

Collaboration between agencies and service providers; Services and facilities provided in a scale that fits the community need;

Economically and ecologically responsible options that fit the rural character and heritage of the community; Provision of needed services to all elderly, regardless of their ability to pay.

### Task Group Accomplishments 2007 (groups began meeting in February of 2007)

#### #1 - Senior Information and Referral . . .

There are currently 17 volunteers for staffing the Key Senior Information Center. The project has received some much needed funding from the Angel Guild Organization.

#### #2 - Transportation & Mobility Services . . .

Transportation and Mobility Services were the #1 concern noted in the most recent, community-wide survey. This task group was recently invited to meet with the Pierce County Transportation Coordination Coalition. *Needed:* volunteer driving pool. Printing services. Further support from volunteers including serving on the task group (with interest or expertise). Group meets 2nd Friday each month.

#### #3 - Elder Health and Wellness Services . . .

Currently identifying the availability of services. **Needed:** Further support from volunteers including serving on the task group (with interest or expertise). Group meets 3rd Thursday each month.

#### #4 - Housing Options for Aging in Place . . .

Recently held a workshop with WA State Senior & Disability
Resource Services investigating the details of opening an adult family
home. Also meeting with providers of assisted living opportunities.

Needed: Further support from volunteers including serving on the
task group (with interest or expertise). Group meets 4th Friday each
month.



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
