President's Message

It appears that we may be nearing some sort of “end” to this pandemic. While we are some distance away from completely controlling this virus, cases and deaths are trending down nationally and locally. We are definitely not out of the woods yet and let’s hope that the light at the end of the tunnel isn’t the train. Despite the

somewhat confusing guidelines, things are getting more active around the clubhouse. David Shiners and his intrepid garden crew are moving swiftly. Check out David’s article in the newsletter for details of all that they have accomplished. Jim Sobieck has been helping with the garden irrigation and lighting, in addition to getting a great deal of work done on the clubhouse and grounds. Katie and Robert continue to work hard at the marina with weekends being very active with visiting boaters.

A casualty of the pandemic are some of our Centennial Celebrations. While we will continue our Centennial stories at the member meetings, the committee has decided to postpone the two large events, Marina Days and a community brunch due to continued uncertainties. We want to include as much of the wider community as possible in these events so postponing them until next year will allow us to do that. In addition, we were notified that repairs to the Virginia V are taking longer than expected. As a result, we will be celebrating the 100th anniversary of that boat next year, in addition to our own Centennial. The actual incorporation date of the LIC was December 10, 1921, so we’re considering some sort of special celebration at the December Member Meeting.

During the May Member Meeting I launched a poll to determine who wanted to attend in-person meetings again. The response was very positive with 85% of attendees indicating that they wanted to attend. The board will be discussing this over the next week or so and if Pierce County remains in Phase 3, we will determine the best way to make this happen. We will also plan to stream the meetings for those who prefer not to attend in person. For me, it would be really nice to have my last meeting as President be an in-person meeting!

The board will work on the logistics of this, depending on whether we meeting in person or not. Note that only regular members are allowed to vote on candidates for board positions.

As I write this, we are expecting the ruling from the hearing examiner on the Pump Out Station any day now. We have sufficient grant monies to move forward on this project and will be scheduling the dive survey in the near future.

On Tuesday May 25, I will be attending a meeting of the Pierce County Council that will allocate funding for the architecture and engineering studies for the roof. The folks who will be doing the study have been waiting patiently and are ready to go as soon as we have contracts which will hopefully be in early June.

This will be my last article as President of the LIC. I have many people to thank for helping me make it through this two-year term, and especially, the last 14 months. First, thanks to all of the board members who worked to continue the business of the organization, always keeping in mind our purpose as an organization and the safety of our members. Special thanks to our advisors Phil Johnson and Francie Carr who provided legal and historical perspective in navigating this very strange period in our history. Big thanks go to the members who pivoted to Zoom meetings and continued to participate in club activities and the community at large as best they could and also to new members who joined us in good faith. I look forward to getting to know better. You are all truly amazing.

A COLLABORATIVE SUCCESS ON THE KEY, Part 1

(Note: This is the first of a two-part series highlighting the success of The Longbranch Foundation in a short five-year period. Part 1 focuses on formation of the organization and funds raised.)

The recent success of The Longbranch Foundation's (TLF) auction for education "Brighter Futures" event in April caused me to reflect back to the beginnings of this organization less than 5 ½ years ago. In 2015, a small working group of LIC members along with our favorite in-house counselor, Phil Johnson, set the wheels in motion to create TLF as an Sec. 501(c)(3) charitable organization.

Formation of TLF was several years in the making. An earlier plan involved some restructuring of the LIC whereas the plan that created TLF left the LIC 100% intact, as it remains to this day. By understanding the issues with that earlier plan, we were able to create a completely new and separate organization that is affiliated with the LIC. In this planning process, we also created a unique feature of TLF in that it has multiple charitable purposes approved by the IRS.

The Articles of Incorporation were filed with the Washington Secretary of State on January 5, 2016 with the paperwork signed by Francie Carr, then president of the LIC. I served as the first president of TLF until July 2017 at which time Barb Floyd was elected president, and Barb has served in that role since. All the above serves to set the stage for the real purpose for this writing, which is to give a huge "thank you" to Barb, TLF's board of directors, the many supporting volunteers, and certainly all the financial supporters over the past 5 ½ years.

The title of this piece is "A Collaborative Success on the Key", and so what does that really mean? It means that TLF has raised more than \$564,000 for the LIC, local students and other community organizations on Key Peninsula during this period. A breakdown of that astounding amount in round numbers follows:

The LIC's Historic Clubhouse (including bi-annual Super Sales)	\$19,000
LIC Grounds & Trails	\$1,650
Scholarship Programs (including bi-annual Auctions)	\$219,900
Longbranch Marina (including Wash. Capital Grant)	\$257,700
Other Community Organizations	\$14,100
The Longbranch Sign	\$6,200
All other non-designated contributions	<u>\$45,450</u>
Grand Total	\$564,000

Any way you look at it, the impact on this community and these two organizations in a relatively short time is simply incredible. My hope is that the phenomenal success of The Longbranch Foundation continues for many, many years. With continued strong leadership by TLF's board of directors, dedicated volunteers to make it all work, and strong financial support by all of you, it will. Congratulations, and a huge thank you, are clearly in order!!!

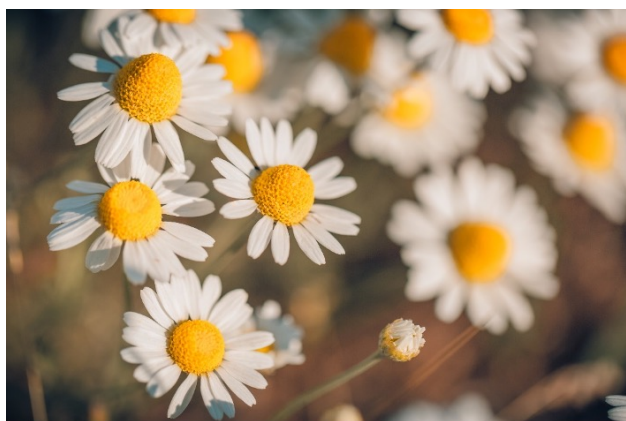

Marsha Kremen, President, called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. and welcomed all members.

Marsha asked members to complete a quick survey about in person membership meetings, with results showing on the screen. This was open during the first part of the meeting.

Membership: There were no renewing members present.

Marsha introduced Tom Nosenzo and his wife, who are new members.

Centennial/LIC Stories: The centennial committee has been collecting LIC stories. Bob Green explained that one of the things that was proposed in the early stages was a Mock Theatre, where people could tell short stories. This morphed into interviewing people due to the pandemic. BOARD REPORTS

Secretary: Marsha asked that the minutes of the April 2021 Membership Meeting be accepted as written and submitted. MSP

Treasurer: Review of the April 2021 financials by Jim Hettinger. Total Income

(revenue) year-to-date is on par with the budget. Our expenses for the year-to-date are more than \$13,000 below budget, which is good.

Events:

The Fiber Arts show and the Farm Tour are a go this year. There will be food trucks available for food this year. Two returning stops to the Farm Tour include Kaukiki Farms and Faraway. The LIC will be a shuttle stop on the south loop.

Buildings and Grounds:

A new front door is ordered that matches the side doors. The light on the flag has been repaired so that it is lit at night. The irrigation on all the flower-beds is up and running as is new irrigation on the rhododendrons, thanks to Jeff Minch. There will be weeding needed so feel free to volunteer. The Centennial garden has made progress with water, power and fence posts. Please contact David Shinnors or Ann Morris if you would like to help with this project. Other projects are planned for this summer, so stay tuned to help. When you record your time for volunteering, please make sure you put which project you are working for.

Evergreen will be doing a drive-through graduation in mid-to late June. We should clean up before that event.

Marina:

Clark reported we must make a series of improvements under the terms of our DNR lease, and the next phase is to replace

three Finger piers immediately behind the pavilion. We had a proposal for the work from Marine Floats for a three-finger pier replacement and a repair to one finger pier on B Dock. We decided to fix the B dock pier ourselves, and we asked for another quote from Marine Floats, but it came back higher than the previous quote. During the course of a conversation, Marsha, Robert and Clark had with Logan Brown, they withdrew their proposal as the cost of materials is changing so quickly, they cannot meet the previous quote. We have decided to ask them to resubmit the proposal with a caveat, that whatever the prices are at the time the permits are approved, that would be the price we agree on. We are waiting for a revised proposal and once the permits are granted, we will have a more definite price. Meanwhile, it is incumbent upon us to find some grant assistant for this project.

We are progressing on the Quilt Project for Evergreen targeting to have a completed quilt in time for the new school opening in the fall.
