# General Meeting Minutes MINUTES 11-14-07...

The dessert meeting was called to order at 7:00 p.m. by President Stu Stuhaug.

#### Officers present were:

Dennis Stu Stuhaug, President John Biggs, Vice-president Tim Heitzman, Treasurer Patricia Latshaw, Secretary Dean Latshaw, Dock Chair Carolyn Wiley, Events Chair Sue Stuhaug, Membership Chair

Minutes from the previous general meeting were approved as written.

Guest Mike Salatino From the Key Peninsula Civic Center spoke to the group about the New Years Eve dance being held at the Civic Center. Tickets are \$35 per person and Sue Stuhaug has them available. The same band and caterer are being used. Also, Mr. Salatino is doing his annual Christmas dinner for seniors and if you know of anyone that would be in need of this other than be alone, please contact Mike Salatino or Marlies VanCise, 884-5608.

Treasurers Report – Tim Heitzman: We are good financially. We have a financially healthy club - as planned last January/February. Some \$28,000 was budgeted for moorage and YTD we have \$32,000. Seems the big yachts can afford the fuel! We've done well on events/entertainment and made new friends. Good chairpersons for the events have really watched costs. Income projected was approximately \$111,000 and to date we are at \$108,000. Expenses, however, were budgeted at \$113,000 and to date they are \$80,000. Year will end on high note.

Dock Report – Dean Latshaw: The LIC Marina is filling up for winter moorage. Members pulling your boat out for the winter are requested to let Dock Master Mark Jones or Dean Latshaw know so they can fill the spot. Question of heaters in boats for winter...

Mr. Latshaw and Mr. Jones are working on chart, costs and billing. Random power checks continue. Electrical rates provide for 200 watts at dock at any given time, summer or winter. 30 boats are signed up with power. Approximately 44 without. The question of electrical meters was again raised. The large capital costs of metering, plus the likelihood of significant rebuilding of the marina electrical grid with contemporary standards. Project is currently on hold while other issues are being handled. The system is legal as it is today, but new work would require inspections and all would have to be brought up to current code. Current cost of power at marina is \$6100 and we have brought in \$9000.

Events Report - Carolyn Wiley: Not a lot but.....Carolyn shared that SOMEONE randomly cut up one of the yoga mats.! It was suggested that the lock on the storage door be changed. Co chairs Debbie Ehrhardt and Traci Michel talked about Trunk or Treat and what a huge success it was. 130 cars here, 28 parked for giving out candy, over 100 kids. The Christmas decorating party will be Dec. 2, 20077. John Biggs is providing the tree this year and Andy Gano will hang from the rafters to secure it. Dec. 16 is the kids Christmas party. The Angel Guild is collecting craft materials for the Boy Scouts, who in turn will help construct presents. Key Pen Key Club is helping wrap gifts. The event needs a digital camera and printer to do the Santa photos this year. There is a jar on the counter for donations to help with the Christmas for kids party. The club usually budgets \$600 for this event and this year we have ZERO. John Glennon is working with Toys for Tots. The event needs a shopper for supplemental supply of toys. Exercise classes continue through November, then break for December and will regroup in January. More plans to follow after the first of the year. The Bob and Betty Knutson washed all the windows today - thank you - they look great!
